Tree-planting

The afternoon of Saturday 8 February was overcast but calm, when our intrepid bunch of tree-planters convened outside Calderbridge. The mission was to plant as many as possible of the 420 trees that had been donated to our church by The Woodland Trust, to create a new native hedgeline along the top edge of Crake Nest wood. We estimated we might manage to plant half of them in the couple of hours we'd allocated so left about 150 in the car.

We set off up the path, armed with spades, trowels, gloves, a wheelbarrow

full of tiny trees, and some shortbread for sustenance. Once at the planting site, everyone chose a section to work on and the trees quickly went into the ground, serenaded by ravens and green woodpeckers amongst other residents. After planting each section, we surrounded the trees with a layer of brash (twigs from previously pruned/felled trees) to help prevent deer from nibbling the new leaves. Alistair was sent to retrieve the remaining trees from the car, and amazingly, between our group of 9, all 420 were planted (actually 419 because I found one little rowan left in the wheelbarrow when we got home! It has been planted in a pot until we can take it back).



See future newsletters for updates on how the Egremont Methodist Church hedge is growing. Alternatively, feel free to go and see it for yourselves - ask Katie or Alistair if you'd like directions (although the trees are currently too small to find unless you know where they were planted).

What the Eye Cannot See

We all love our church. Every Sunday we meet together as friends for fellowship with each other, knowing that the Spirit of God is with us. The building looks good, the heating is on, the flowers lend a bit of colour to the place, the screen and microphone are in situ and thirty or so chairs have been set out to be sat upon. The church furniture – communion table, bible and stand, lectern and, most important of all, the Cross – completes the picture. It is a lovely atmosphere and it is so, so comfortable.

Throughout the week our building is used in many different ways and various community events take place there. After the Sunday service it is stripped of all the artefacts required for a church and it becomes a church hall until the following Sunday when it is set up once again for the church service.

How does this happen? How are chairs removed from the back storage space into the main hall? Where do the flowers come from? Who organises all the IT stuff? – certainly not me! Who checks that a preacher is definitely coming and arranges for readers and piano or organ music? Who counts the offering and who ensures that it goes to the bank and, very importantly, who keeps the church accounts? Who keeps the building clean? Who looks after the bricks and mortar? Who regulates the heating? Who fixes things when it all goes wrong?

There is so much more to keeping a church and its buildings going than many of us realise.

It is our regular church members who undertake all these tasks, and we are very grateful to them. Their skills are invaluable, and we appreciate their commitment to the church and its survival. We are grateful that we don't have to pay accountants fees, administration fees, cleaning fees nor fees associated with problems arising from electrics, water, and the bricks and mortar of the building. We pay for the big work, but the manageable stuff is carried out by people in our congregation – one of whom who may be sitting beside you the next time you are at a church service. The volume of physical work involved in keeping the church and its building going is enormous and most of us are unaware of it. We cannot see behind the scenes – we only see the finished product and we enjoy immensely the fruits of the labours of others.

It is getting harder for those of us of advancing years. Although we may not be able to do the big things we once did, there are many small tasks which may be a possibility for some. In fact, we are considering splitting the large jobs into smaller jobs to make them more manageable.

Our main concerns at the moment are church cleaning and coffee mornings (Katie tells me that coffee mornings last year raised £2,500 for church funds) and it would be great if we could have some extra help with these. Those involved already (Janet, Margaret, Linda or Gillian) would be pleased to inform anyone interested about what this entails.

Mike said that the 5-yearly inspection of church premises had taken place recently, with no urgent matters identified.

Gillian reported on how we are preparing for the time that John leaves in August, with several people already identified to take on certain roles.

Katie referred to the Energy Audit carried out last year. We agreed to set up an Eco Project group - see Katie's article below.

Doug reported that Churches Together had decided to formally close after more than 40 years, with the more local side of the Coast to Fells Mission Community being effectively the successor organisation.

Following an energy/eco audit of our building last year, the January Church Council meeting agreed to convene a small group of people who are interested in helping with an eco improvements project for our church.

The project is likely to include a new roof (finally!), fitted with solar panels, and replacing the gas boiler with heat pump(s) amongst other energy improvements, which will help us meet our church aim of achieving Net Zero carbon emissions by 2030. We will need people to help plan the project, write publicity, apply for grants, and meet with/supervise tradespeople. Lent Courses

This year during Lent, together with the Mission Community, Open House Fellowship will be looking at the book Women of Holy Week by Paula Gooder. This is a series of nine stories about nine different, but interlinked, women. Starting with Palm Sunday and finishing with Ascension Day, these nine stories imagine what it might have been like to accompany Jesus in this final week of his life from the perspective of nine women. Some of them we know with certainty were there because the Gospels tell us they were: the widow with two coins, the woman with the ointment of pure nard, Mary wife of Clopas, Mary Magdalene, Mary mother of Jesus. Some are not mentioned at all, but someone like them was probably present: a woman journeying to Jerusalem for the Passover, the wife of a scribe, and a female disciple at the Last Supper. The stories also aim to travel from the outside in: from people who had the most fleeting encounters with Jesus at the start of the week to his most devoted followers at the end.

There are three opportunities to study the stories of these women during Lent:
